Executive Director Focus

Dear Friends,

For this Pet Press, we celebrate 50 years of saving lives!

What a truly remarkable accomplishment and I am so proud to have been part of it for the last 23 years. As I look back, each pet we helped (and continue to help), every volunteer and donor, the many fundraising events and pleas for help, and the countless hours of dedication and hard work have brought us to this moment of celebration.

Looking back reminds me of my "why". Why do I do the work I do? Animal rescue is hard. There is *nothing easy* about saving lives, raising money, dealing with drama and negative people, and balancing work and family. There are days when my best isn't good enough and my heart breaks into a million pieces; but then there are days when I "remember" when I saved a life, changed a life, or helped bring the unconditional love of a pet into a home.

My "why" will always come back to this quote: "Saving one animal will not change the world. But surely the world will change for that one animal" (Author Unknown). Since I started with SafeHaven 23 years ago, we have saved, rescued, fostered, and adopted out approximately 36,000 animals. Each one took a piece of my heart with them, and they all took my promise with them; a promise that I "see them" and their lives will get better.


"The Promise: Abby's Story"

The van was full. Six dogs were loaded into crates and ready for their trip to SafeHaven when the animal control officer said, "Chris, will you please take Abby too? She is one of my favorites and is already scheduled for euthanasia on Monday morning due to her age. Can't you please just fit one more?" I looked at the crates stacked in the passenger van and thought: Where?

I went to meet Abby. She was a beautiful 8-year-old Rottweiler with the sweetest brown eyes I had ever seen. She was so depressed that she never even lifted her head to greet me. She just laid on the concrete kennel floor and stared straight ahead. The officer told me her owners had surrendered her and her brother who had been her constant companion for years and he had been adopted without her. To me it seemed she had given up and her spirit was broken. That one look is all it took. Abby needed SafeHaven. I promised her life would get better and I loaded her into the van. During the long drive, Abby began to perk up and look around like she knew better days were ahead. Upon arriving at SafeHaven, Abby immediately won over each and every one of the staff and volunteers. She was so sweet and easy to work with and had a kindness about her that was rare. Unfortunately, soon after she arrived, she developed a horrible case of kennel cough that developed into pneumonia, and then a mammary tumor was discovered. Abby was battling pneumonia and possibly cancer, too. But I had a promise to keep!

With the help of Linn Veterinary Hospital and Dr. Braat, Abby began recovering from pneumonia and a plan was made for the mammary tumor. Once Abby was well enough, x-rays would be taken to see if the cancer had spread. If it had not, Abby would be spayed and the tumor removed at the same time. For two weeks, staff and volunteers helped Abby recover from the pneumonia and we all kept our fingers crossed for this special dog. On July 2, 2007, the tumor was removed and Abby was given a clean bill of health.



Abby is a dog that I will never forget. In fact, just re-reading her story brought me to tears. Abby and so many like her are my "Why". A dog who was so close to being overlooked and euthanized due to her age and breed, was given

a chance at SafeHaven and was adopted by a family who volunteered at SafeHaven at that time.

For 23 years, and for many, many more years to come, I will continue to make that promise to many other animals just like Abby.

That is my "Why". Thank you for celebrating this huge milestone with us!

But before you take them to the recycle bin, let us fill you in on an easy way to help out homeless pets! **It's as simple as 1-2-3**. Follow these simple steps to recycle your cans and bottles all while saving animals and helping them find perfect forever homes.

GET. Pick up your blue Bottle Drop bag from SafeHaven (the shelter, either Gift & Thrift store, or we can mail one to you)!

FILL. Fill your blue Bottle Drop bag with recyclable bottles and cans.

DROP. Bring your full Bottle Drop bag to SafeHaven or to ANY Bottle Drop Center in Oregon. As long as the bag is from Safe-Haven, the funds will be allocated to the animals in our care.

Our grand total from BottleDrop for 2023 was \$13,932. This total makes 2023 our biggest year yet. We're hoping to go up from here!

HAMMIE'S BIG BREAK

We'd like to introduce you to **Hammie Chambers**, this quarter's Pet Press cover pet! Hammie, luckily, found himself at the home of **Dave and Darlene Chambers**, longtime SafeHaven supporters and two people with the patience a cat like Hammie needed. Darlene recalls how Hammie became theirs:

"One morning a year ago April, I woke up to our dog, Shasta "stalking" my nightstand. Figuring she had rolled yet another ball under it, I moved the nightstand only to be startled by a small gray & white creature leaping over the stand and making a run for it to our family room. There I discovered it was a kitten, now hiding behind another piece of furniture. From there he (although we didn't know which gender he was at that time) dashed out to our front room, which is my "chaos" room. Lots of boxes, a floor loom, spinning wheels, LOTS of stuff! It was the perfect room for the kitten to hide! There was no catching him; he was definitely feral and very afraid of us. We set him up with water, food and a litter box and for weeks only caught brief glimpses of him. I guessed him to be barely eight weeks old and he definitely knew nothing about using any of the above. Consequently, he made big messes every time he ate, drank or used the litter box. We made adjustments, and it was better. Thankfully, we have tiled floors.

There is a cartoon character, a little boy, named Hammie, who is always getting into messes, so Dave thought that a good name. Also, he frequently slept in the hammock of my weaving loom.

It took close to three months before he let Dave touch him, with a little scratch on top of his head. Hammie then bonded closely with Dave and began coming out of his room a little at a time. When it came time for immunizations, we popped him into a carrier and he didn't say a word, behaving perfectly. Turns out, he was probably in shock, because when it was time for neutering, he wouldn't let us get him anywhere near a carrier! Eventually, weeks later, we were able to trick him into it. He was definitely not happy about that! Now Hammie is a happy one-year old and obviously here to stay. He gets along well with our dog and older two cats.

How did he get into the house? He had been living in our grass field and probably barn and apparently started coming closer to the house. We think he saw our animals using their doors and followed. He definitely has a "survivor" personality as he was catching mice and voles in the field and is extremely quick. Also meant he was full of round worms. He's had no desire to use those same doors to go out!

Now he explores the yard, garage, shop and barn at times, but always comes back to the people door to be let back in. We've gotta work on that! Also, wish us luck for the next vet visit!"

June is National Adopt a Cat Month







Here are our top three reasons (although the list goes on) to adopt a feline friend this month!

According to the ASPCA, about 3.2 million cats end up in US animal shelters each year. Sadly, about 530,000 are euthanized. Choosing to adopt means saving lives of other feline lives as well. When you adopt from a shelter, it opens space so they can care for another cat until they, too, find their forever home.

#2 Adopting is a smart financial choice.

You'll take home a cat that is up to date on vaccines, already spayed or neutered, and even microchipped when you adopt from SafeHaven.

#3 It's good for your overall health.

Studies show that adopting a cat can positively affect a human's ability to cope with anxiety, loneliness, depression, and stress. Research has shown that:

Pet owners are less likely to suffer from depression than those without pets.

Playing with a cat can elevate serotonin and dopamine levels, which help to calm and relax.

It's good for your physical health too! In addition to helping mental and emotional health, cats can improve physical health as well. Cats make their owners less susceptible to heart trouble and cardiovascular disease by lowering stress levels. The sound of a purring cat can even help heal tendons and bones while enhancing joint mobility after injuries. Plus, kids raised around cats are less likely to develop sensitivities to many common allergens.

SafeHaven: A True Community Resource

SafeHaven Humane Society is dedicated to finding permanent, loving homes for all animals entrusted in our care. As a private, non-profit 501(c)(3) organization, our mission is to help residents of our communities be the best humane beings they can be by providing compassionate, temporary shelter care, healthy adoptable animals, information, understanding and education, and spay and neuter program.

SafeHaven is a limited admission shelter that is committed to the philosophy of not using euthanasia to control pet population. Once an animal enters SafeHaven, there is no limit to the amount of time that animal can spend at the facility. Once the shelter is full, however, no new animals can be accepted, thus preventing the current residents from being euthanized to make room for newcomers. It is this policy that differentiates SafeHaven from publicly funded "open admission" facilities. As a full adoption shelter, SafeHaven has pledged to care for the dogs, cats, and small animals in our custody until they find a forever home. With an 11-member Board of Directors, a 50-member paid staff, and over 400 dedicated volunteers, SafeHaven does not receive funding from any governmental agency and relies on our programs, community, and grants to keep our mission going.

MISSION

Finding Homes, Opening Hearts, and Educating Minds to strengthen and improve the lives of animals and people.

VISION

We envision a community where every adoptable, treatable companion animal has a loving home and where every loving home has the opportunity to care for a companion animal.

VALUES

We are guided by the belief that no adoptable or treatable companion animal should be unnecessarily euthanized due to space, time, appearance or treatable conditions. We are committed to:

- Giving a new chance to companion animals who would otherwise be discarded.
- Strengthening the human-animal bond through education.
- Helping people and their companion animals stay together through the support of programs and services.
- · Leading responsibly with compassion.

How SafeHaven Grew

1974 – A network of animal lovers came together to create **Linn Humane Society.** They rescued abandoned and abused dogs and fostered them in their homes.

1985 – A small estate left to SafeHaven allowed them to put a down payment for the one-acre parcel of land on Hwy 34.

1986 – A modular home is added and becomes the original site you may remember.

1993 – Linn Humane Society expands to begin helping felines as well.

1994 – Linn Humane Society was being mistaken for Linn County Animal Control. After seeking the community's suggestions for a new name, they agreed on SafeHaven Humane Society.

2001 – Chris Storm joined the SafeHaven staff.

2007 – Our first low-cost spay and neuter program, Cat's Count, began.

2009 – SafeHaven creates the Rescue Me transport program.

2011 – A generous bequest gives SafeHaven the opportunity to purchase a building to renovate as their new home. Fundraising continues for construction costs over the next few years.

2012 – SafeHaven opens a Pet Boutique & Home Décor store in downtown Albany. This will later become SafeHaven Gift & Thrift.

May 2014 – After outgrowing the small pet boutique, SafeHaven Gift & Thrift is opened in Tangent, OR.

July 2014 - SafeHaven's operations move from their original building to the new location we are in now!

2018 – The second Gift & Thrift location is opened in Lebanon, OR.

2019 – SafeHaven adds a medical suite to their location.

2021 – SafeHaven begins wellness clinic for community owned pets.

2023 – SafeHaven opens on-site low-cost spay and neuter program for the community

2024 – New quiet rooms for higher needs dogs are built and added to shelter.

2024 – Doggy Day Out program begins (see next page).

Here at SafeHaven, we strive to make the animals as comfortable as possible while they wait for their forever home. Helpful Resources

Warm Weather Pet Safety

You might know that cold weather poses health risks to your pets, but so does warm weather – even on days that don't seem that hot to you. Knowing the risks and being prepared can help keep your pet safe. Here are some helpful hints to keep in mind as the weather continues to warm up:

1. Talk to your veterinarian about warm weather risks for pets (and travel safety if you plan to travel with a pet).

2. Make sure your pets have unlimited access to fresh water, and access to shade when outside.

3. Keep your pet free of parasites that are more common during warm weather, such as fleas, ticks and heartworm.

4. Never leave a pet in the car, even in the shade or with windows cracked. Cars can overheat quickly to deadly temperatures, even when the weather isn't severe.

5. If it's hot outside for you, it's even hotter for your pet. Remember, they are wearing a fur coat!

6. Take walks, hikes or runs during the cooler hours of the day.

7. Avoid hot surfaces, such as asphalt, that can burn your pet's paws.

8. Ask your veterinarian if your pet would benefit from a warm-weather haircut or other protection.

SIGNS OF HEAT STRESS

Seek emergency veterinary care if you observe any of these signs:

Anxiousness Excessive panting Excessive drooling Abnormal gum and tongue color Collapse


Gift and Thrift
